What is an apprenticeship?

A real job that combines practical training in your role with study where you will:

- Work with experienced staff
- Gain job-specific skills
- Earn a wage and get paid holiday
- Given time for study related to the role in work hours
- 80% of your time is spent at work and 20% studying and working towards a qualification
- Can take from 1-6 years to complete depending on the level

What are the entry requirements?

They're open to anyone aged 16+ living in England and is not in full time education

What do apprentices earn?

The National Minimum Wage for apprentices is £3.90 per hour from April 2019. This applies to those aged under 19, those aged 19 or over and not in the first year of their apprenticeship will be entitled to the National Minimum Wage.
